

Ibrox Event Day Parking Controls

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I qualify for a parking permit?

Properties that fall within the identified zone boundary may make application for a parking permit. Permits are considered for both residential and business properties, residential applicants may also qualify for visitor's parking permits.

Can I obtain more than one parking permit?

Yes, applications can be submitted for all residents vehicles registered within the identified zone boundary. Businesses can also apply for a permit for each of their employees.

What is the cost of a parking permit?

Resident and Business parking permits are issued free of charge, providing the appropriate documentation is submitted. Visitor's parking permits are issued at a cost of £10 each. The visitor parking permit does not have a registration number on it, therefore you can give it to different visitors.

An administration charge of £10 applies to all lost permits.

I have a blue badge, do I need a permit?

No, just make sure you display your blue badge when the event day parking controls are in operation.

What about churches / community groups?

This scheme is designed to keep the local community operating as normal whenever these events take place so churches and community groups would be able to apply for permits in the same way as businesses.

What if I change my car?

Permits are not currently marked with vehicle registrations. They are issued for a period of ten years therefore they are transferable to vehicles registered to the qualifying address.

Can visitors to Ibrox obtain permits to park?

No. The scheme is to assist the local community during event times.

I live on one of the emergency routes, where can I park?

You can park in the event day parking zone areas with your permit.

When is the event day parking zone enforced?

The zone is enforced at event times only, times and dates will be displayed at all entry points to the event day parking zone in advance of event days. Generally an event day parking zone is in place 3 hours before the event starts and up to 1 hour after the event finishes.

What happens next?

In February 2017 the Council will commence the statutory process to promote the parking controls.

The first step is consultation with emergency services, freight transport and road haulage associations, SPT and internal departments to see if they have any operational issues with the proposed scheme.

We then publicise the proposed scheme. A notice goes in the Evening Times and we will also put up notices on-street.

This is when the general public can write in and support the scheme or object to it. This lasts for 3 weeks.

Following the completion of this phase a report will be prepared and a decision will be made based on the report.
